Will of Walter Stallard

Culpeper County, Virginia, July 13, 1803 (Probated April 20, 1807)

In the name of God Amen, I WALTER STALLARD of Culpeper County being sick and weak but of perfect sense and memory do make and ordain this my last will and Testament in manner and form following:

Imprimus I give my soul to God and body to the Earth to be decently buried at the discretion of my Executor hereafter name

Item I give and bequeath to my beloved wife HANNAH STALLARD all my Estate of what here so ever during her Natural life

Item I give and bequeath unto Daughter ELIZA CAVENDER the sum of one Hundred Dollars to be raised out of my Estate after the Decease of my wife Hannah

Item I give and bequeath to my son DAVID STALLARD one-half of all my stock of Hogs after the Decease of my wife Hannah

Item I give unto my son SAMUEL STALLARD the sum of five Shillings to him and his heirs forever

Item I give unto my Daughters PEGGY ELRSE and RACHEL LITTRELL the sum of five Shillings each to them and their heirs forever

Item I give and bequeath unto my son RANDOLPH STALLARD, my Daughters MARY ANN SCOTT and FANNY SHUMATE all the rest and residue of my Estate not herefore given. After the Decease of my wife to be Sold to the highest bidder and the money arising from such Sale to be equally divided between them the said Randolph, Mary Ann, and Fanny and their heirs forever.

Lastly I Innominate and Appoint my son RANDOLPH STALLARD Executor of this my last will and Testament utterly renouncing all and every will by me heretofore made. In witness where of I have here unto set my hand and affixed my seal this thirteenth day of July in the year of Our Lord Christ one thousand eight hundred and three.

WILL OF ROBERT LUTTRELL, Dated April 2, 1812

In the Name of God. Amen. I, ROBERT LUTTRELL of Prince William Co. &
Commonwealth of VA being in my perfect senses, do make and ordain this my
last will and testament in manner and form following, to wit:

Imprints: I give and bequeath to my wife NANCY LUTTRELL, for and during her
natural life the use of the one sixth part of my slaves, the one sixth of all my
stock, all my household and kitchen furniture, with the use of my mansion
house and two hundred acres of land thereunto adjoining, part of which land
was formerly the property of PHILEMON WATERS. And after the death of my
said wife I give and devise the aforesaid land to my two sons Simon and
Thomas to be equally divided between them; and the slaves devised to my wife,
after her death, to be equally divided between my three daughters Margaret,
Jane and Peggy, for them and their heirs forever.

Item - I give and bequeath to my son SIMON LUTTRELL, and to his heirs forever
the plantation that BENSON LYNN lives on, containing 166 acres, and 426 1/2
acres of land adjoining the land of MYSIA TELLS and JOHN McMILLAN; the one
sixth part of my slaves; the one sixth part of all my stock except horses; and
there is to be deducted four hundred and sixty dollars out of his part.

Item - I give and bequeath unto my son THOMAS LUTTRELL, and his heirs
forever 592 1/2 acres of land, the one sixth part of my slaves and the one sixth
part of all my stock; but in case my land shall contain more than 1355 acres,
what is over is to be equally divided between my two sons Simon and Thomas.

Item - I give and bequeath to my daughter MELINDA DAVIS, and to her heirs
forever the one sixth part of my slaves and the one sixth part of all my stock.

Item - I give and bequeath to my daughter JANE LUTTRELL, and to her heirs forever the one sixth part of my slaves, the one sixth part of all my stock, and one hundred dollars, one bed and furniture, one bedstead and desk.

Item - I gave and bequeath to my daughter PEGGY LUTTRELL, and to her heirs forever the one sixth part of my slaves, the one sixth part of all my stock, and bed, bedstead, and furniture for said bed, and desk, a saddle and bridle.

All my property that is not mentioned in this will is to be equally divided between my wife and children. My wife is to be provided with a sufficient quantity of pork, corn, and ect. to last her family twelve months after my death.

It is my wish that my son THOMAS LUTTRELL, is sent to school five years, his schooling and board to be paid out of my estate.

Lastly; I do hereby constitute and appoint my son SIMON LUTTRELL, and JOHN F. DAVIS, to be the executors of this my last will and testament hereby revoking all other wills and testaments by me heretofore made. In witness whereof I gave set my hand and affixed my seal this 2nd day of April in the year 1812.

St. Stephen's Parish, Northumberland County, Virginia Will - **RICHARD LITREL (LUTTRELL)**, dated: April 24, 1781, Probated: February 13, 1786

In the name of God Amend, I RICHARD LITREL, of St. Stephen's Parish and County of Northumberland, being sick and weak but in prefect mind and memory thanks be to almighty God for it, calling into mind the mortality of my body, do and ordain this my Last Will and Testament and first I bequeath my soul to God who gave it me and my body to buried in decent Christian burial at the discretion of my Executors who I shall hereafter name - nothing doubting but that I shall receive the same at the general resurrection at the last day through the mighty power of God and as touching such worldly goods as it hath pleased God to bless me with I give and devise in the following manner and form Viz.

Item - I give and bequeath to my son MOSES LITREL, the brack of land I bought of William BAYLIS, to him and his heirs forever.

Item - I give and bequeath to my son RICHARD LITREL, the plantation whereon I now live to him and his heirs forever and if my son RICHARD LITREL, should die without heirs then it is my desire it should fall to my son JOHN LITREL, and his heirs forever.

Item - I give and bequeath to my son JOHN LITREL, my still, also my gray horse Darby, also my best feather bed and furniture, also my gun to him and his heirs forever, and if my son JOHN LITREL, should die without heir it is my desire all the above RICHARD LITREL, and his heirs forever.

Item - I give and bequeath to my loving wife ANN LITREL, my sorrel mare Fly, also my new pine chest.

Item - I give and bequeath all the remaining part of my estate be it of what nature soever not already given to be equally divided immediately after my decease between my son JOHN LITREL, and my daughter MARY WARRICK HEADLEYS, children and my daughter REBECAH WILLIAMS, children.

Item - I give and bequeath to my daughter MARY WARRICK HEADLEY, one shilling sterling.

Item - I give to my daughter REBECAH WILLIAMS, one shilling sterling.

Lastly; I nominate and appoint my two sons RICHARD LITREL and JOHN LITREL, Executors of this my Last Will and Testament ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my Last Will and Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this twenty forth day of April, 1781.

This Last Will and Testament of Richard LUTTRELL, dec's, was presented in Court by John LUTTRELL, one of the Executors therein named who made oath thereto according to law and the same was proved by the oaths of Thomas COELMAN and John SMITH, two of the witnesses thereto and security a certificate is granted him for obtaining probate thereof in due form Ann LUTTRELL, the widow of the said dec'd having recented thereto.

Northumberland County, Virginia Will - ANN LITTRELL (RICE), Dated: January 10, 1794, Probated: April 14, 1795

In the name of God Amen. I ANN LITTRELL; of the County of Northumberland being sick and weak of body but of perfect sense and memory, I thank God for the same do make and ordain this to be my last Will and Testament, in manner and form as followth. First I give and bequeath my soul to God my maker to dispose of at his blessed will and pleasure and my body to be decently buried; and for my worldly goods which it hath pleased to my brother JOHN RICE, the bed and furniture that was left to me by my father and my largest iron pot and hooks to him and his heirs for ever.

Item - I give to SUSANAH HILL, my best calico gound and black handkerchief.

Item - I give to my two sisters WINNEZFRED WAY, and SARAHAN RICE, the remainder part of my cloths to be equally divided between them.

Item - I give my side saddle to my sister SARAHAN RICE.

Item - I give to my sister WINNEZFRED WAY, my pine chest.

Item - I give to SUSANAH HILL, my box iron and heters.

Item - I give to brother ISAAC RICE, my large puter dish.

It is my will and desire that after my just debts are paid that all the remainder part of my estate that is not already given to be equally divided amongst all my brothers and sisters namely; ISAAC RICE, JOHN RICE, WINNYFRED WAY, SARAHAN RICE, to them and their heirs lawfully begotten of their body and if either of them should die without lawful heirs begotten of their body it is my will and desire that their part be equally divided between the surviving brothers and sisters and their heirs. Lastly I do nominate and appoint my two brothers ISAAC RICE and JOHN RICE to be my whole and sole Executors of this my last will and testament revoking and denying all other will or wills heretofore made by me or any other. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 10th day of January, 1794.

At a court of monthly session continued and held for Northumberland County at the Courthouse on Tuesday the 14th day of April, 1795. This last will and

testament of Ann LITTRELL, dec'd was this day proved in open court by the oaths of George LAMKIN and George RICE the witnesses thereto, and is ordered to be recorded. And on the motion of Isaac RICE and John RICE the Executors therein named a certificate is granted them for obtaining a probate thereof in due form, they having taken the oath of executors and together with James HUDNALL their security entered into and acknowledged a bond in the penalty of one hundred pounds, conditioned as the law directs.

Overwharton Parish, Stafford County, Virginia Will - **JOHN COMBS, SR.**, Dated: March 13, 1786, D&W Book 8, May 1780-13 March 1786, Pages 359-360,

Will of John Combs, Sr. March 13, 1786 of Overwharton Parish, Stafford County.

To my grandson NIMROD, son of my son JOHN COMBS dec'd, 10 shillings sterling .

To my heir at law called JOHN COMBS, tho not christened, son of my son John dec'd, 10 shilling sterling.

To my Wife SETH COMBS during her natural life the following fifteen slaves (named) which were given to her and myself by deed from her father BENJAMIN BULLET.

To my son CUTHBERT the land he lives on and which were conveyed to him heretofore by me, and also 1/3 part of the slaves devised his Mother and their future increase, after the death of his Mother.

To my daughter BETTY CALLMERS, Negro Tim, in the possession of her husband, which I formerly gave her, and 1/3 part of the slaves devised her Mother, after the decease of her Mother.

To my daughter in law SALLY LUTTRELL COMBS, Negro James during her widowhood to support her children; and after her marriage or decease, I give said slave to her children to be equally divided among all her children and their heirs, which she hath had by my son JOHN, as well those children born before as after marriage.

To all the children of my son JOHN, as well those born before as after marriage, their heirs, after decease of their Grand Mother 1/3 par of the aforesaid slaves devised her and their future increase. Lend wife Seth during her widowhood the plantation and lands I now live on, on the south side of Beaver Dam run and after her marriage or decease I give the same to my son Joseph and his heirs. To my son ENNIS and heirs, Negroes Harry, Venus, Hester and Dinah and their increase, and also the tract of land he now lives on, and 803 acs. of land in Kentucky, a part of the Negroes are now in his possession. To my son BENJAMIN COMBS. (This abstract stops here with the comment that pages 303 and 304 are missing.)

In the name of God amen the 24th day of April One thousand eight hundred and nineteen. I RICHARD LUTTRELL of Culpeper County being of perfect memory do hereby make my Last Will and Testament in manner and form following. That is to say.

First to my four following children to wit WILLIS LUTTRELL, JAMES LUTTRELL, SUSANNAH LUTTRELL & FANNY LUTTRELL I give each one feather bed, bedstead [bed stand?] and furniture.

2naly To RACHEL my dearly beloved wife I lend the use of profits of all the rest of my Estate both real & personal during her natural life and after her decease I give to my two daughters Susanna & Fanny the following Negroes namely Frederick, Joseph, Harriott, Guss, Dopen, & Eliza and all their increase to be enjoyed by them and their heirs forever by an equal division between them at the death of their mother.

3dly My desire is that my land be sold as also the rest of my Negroes namely Anthony Selena Scepio Matelda [?] Aylell and all their [?] increase on a credit of twelve months and that the land be first sold in two tracts agreeable to a survey and division thereof for 283 1/2 acres more or less without a resurvey the deciding line beginning at a small branch a white oak sapling standing on the east and a white oak and hickory on the west side whereof is the line of THOMAS KEMPER and extending down said branch with [?] meanders to a larger branch to three maples one on each side of the small branch and one on the north side of the larger branch thence down said branch [five poles?] to two maples at the mouth of another small branch thence up the meanders thereof to its head and continuing thence North thirty three degrees West to a box oak and two white oak saplings on this one line of the tract which is also the line of WILLIAM COOKE leaving on the south side of dividing line 15 3/4 acres on which the dwelling house stands and on the north side 130 1/4 acres and the monies or [thos?] profits arising from such sale to be equally divided between my four following children to wit BURRELL, WILLIS, ELIZABETH wife of THOMAS STALLARD and JAMES and their heirs.

4thly All the rest and residue of my property except the crops which may then be on the land I wish to be sold on the same credit as aforementioned [?] the crops to be sold for [?]ady money the wheat crop at private and the other crops at public sale and out of the monies are [?] from such sales my son WILLIS is first to receive the sum of two hundred dollars and the [residue?] to be equally divided among all my children namely BURRELL, WILLIS, ELIZABETH, JAMES, SUSANNA and FANNY.

5thly I hereby constitute and appoint my aforesaid wife RACHEL Executrix and my friends HENRY BASGE and THOMAS G. KEMPER executors of this my last will and Testament and I do hereby utterly disallow, revoke and disannull all and every former Wills and Testaments ratifying and conforming this and no other to be my last Will and Testament [?] witness whereof I have here unto set my hand and seal the day and year first above written.

To have and to hold as their lawful share of said proceeds. I hereby appoint my son WM. C. LUTTRELL as my executor and desire that he execute this my will as it is written, which is in accordance with my wishes. On testimony I set my hand and seal.

This November the 3rd 1886. Signed: R.W. Luttrell.

At the request of Robt. W. Luttrell we witness his signature to the above instrument as he desires us to do, and today is of sound mind.

In the name of GOD Amen, this 10th day of September 1764. I Richard LUTTRELL of Fauquier County, in the Colony of Virginia being of perfect health and sound mind and memory thanks be given to GOD for it therefore calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men to once die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament, that the hands of Almighty GOD that gave it and my body I recommend to earth to be buried in a decent christian burial at the descretion of my Executors nothing doubting that at the General resurection I shall receive the same by the Mighty of GOD and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it has pleased GOD to bless me in the manner following:

IN PRIMIS I give to my son James Luttrell, 70 acres of land more or less and being the land whereon he now lives and bounded by me.

ITEM I give to my son Michael Luttrell 70 acres of land more or less being the land whereon he now lives and being on the same side of the run that my son James Lives on and bounded by me.

ITEM I give to my son Samuel Luttrell 70 acres of land more or less being the same land and plantation whereon he now lives and where John Collier formerly lived and bounded by me.

ITEM I give to my son John Luttrell 70 acres of land more or less it being that part of land whereon he now lives and bounded by me.

ITEM I give to my son Richard Luttrell my new patent of land containing 58 acres of land whereon he now lives.

ITEM I give to my daughter Antiss Luttrell part of the land that I bought off George Crump lying on the south side of Rocke Run that runs from John Nelsons old field to William Raussaus mill bounded by Woods line, Forsythes line and Dearmons line, containing 80 acres of land more or less.

ITEM I give to my daughter Mary Luttrell part of the said land on the west side of the run bounded by Woods line, Dearmans line and Peters line and the ridge path that goes from John Combs to John Nelsons, containing 80 acres of land more or less.

ITEM I give to my daughter Susan Luttrell the remainder part of the land on the west side of the said path bounded by woods line and Peters line, containing 80 acres of land more or less.

ITEM I give to my son Robert Luttrell the plantation whereon I now live and the remaining part of my land adjoining to my said plantation being 74 acres of land more or less.

ITEM I give to my son Robert one feather bed and furniture, my new gun, sword and couch box.

ITEM I give to my daughter Catherine Corum five pounds of current money of the Colony to be raised within the compass of one year after my decease, out of what part of my moveable estate my Executors and Executri shall think most proper to sell for the raising of said money.

ITEM I give to my daughter Sarah Luttrell five pounds and my young bay mare branded on or near the buttock to be delivered to her at the age of eighteen or married.

ITEM I give to my granddaughter Mary Corum five pounds of current money of Virginia to be paid at the age of eighteen or when she is married.

ITEM I give to my loving wife, Mary all the rest of my moveable estate to be by possessed and enjoyed during her natural life and after her decease to be equally divided amongst my children.

ITEM I constitute my loving wife, Mary and sons, Richard and Robert Luttrell to be Executors of this my last will and testament and do hereby utterly, disallow, revoke and dismell all and every other former testament, wills, legates and bequeathed ratifying this to be my last will and testament and no other in witness thereof I have hereunto set my hand seal, day and year above written VS.

I, JAMES LUTTERELL, of the County of Northumberland and Parish of St. Stephen's, being of sound and perfect mind and memory praise be to God, do make this my Last Will and Testament in manner and form following, that is to say; first and principally I commend my soul into the hands of Almighty God that gave it, and body to be decently buried at the discretion of my Executors hereafter named, and as touching the disposition (?) of all such temporal estate as it hath pleased Almighty God to bestow upon, I give and dispose thereof as followth.

I leave to my loving wife FRANCES LUTTERELL, my plantation in Richmond County, during her natural life, and then to my daughter BETTY LUTTERELL, to her and her heirs lawfully begotten, and if she should die without such heirs, then the plantation to fall to my son LEROY LUTTERELL, and his heirs.

Item - I give and bequeath to my two sons Robert and Simon LUTTRELL, after all my just debts and legacies be paid all my cash, debts, bills and bonds with a negro girl called Nell, to be valued and the value added to cash and equally divided between my two sons Robert and Simon LUTTRELL excepting five pounds of the money to be given to my wife Jean.

To my daughter in law Sally LUTTRELL Combs, Negro James during her widowhood to support her children; and after her marriage or decease, I give said slave to her children to be equally divided among all her children and their heirs, which she hath had by my son John, as well those children born before as after marriage.

To all the children of my son John, as well those born before as after marriage, their heirs, after decease of their Grand Mother 1/3 par of the aforesaid slaves devised her and their future increase. Lend wife Seth during her widowhood the plantation and lands I now live on, on the south side of Beaver Dam run and after her marriage or decease I give the same to my son Joseph and his heirs. To my son Ennis and heirs, Negroes Harry, Venus, Hester and Dinah and their increase, and also the tract of land he now lives on, and 803 acs. of land in Kentucky, a part of the Negroes are now in his possession. To my son Benjamin Combs. (This abstract stops here with the comment that pages 303 and 304 are missing.)

2naly To RACHEL my dearly beloved wife I lend the use of profits of all the rest of my Estate both real & personal during her natural life and after her decease I give to my two daughters Susanna & Fanny the following Negroes namely Frederich, Joseph, Harriott, Guss, Dapon, & Eliza and all their increase to be enjoyed by them and their heirs forever by an equal division between them at the death of their mother.

3dly My desire is that my land be sold as also the rest of my Negroes namely Anthony Selena Scepio Matelda [?] Aylell and all their [?] increase on a credit of twelve months and that the land be first sold in two tracts agreeable to a survey and division thereof for 283 1/2 acres more or less without a resurvey the deciding line beginning at a small branch a white oak sapling standing on the east and a white oak and hickory on the west side whereof is the line of THOMAS KEMPER and extending down said branch with [?] meanders to a larger branch to three maples one on each side of the small branch and one on the north side of the larger branch thence down said branch [five poles?] to two maples at the mouth of another small branch thence up the meanders thereof to its head and continuing thence North thirty three degrees West to a box oak and two white oak saplings on this one line of the tract which is also the line of WILLIAM COOKE leaving on the south side of dividing line 15 3/4 acres on which the dwelling house stands and on the north side 130 1/4 acres and the monies or [thos?] profits arising from such sale to be equally divided between my four following children to wit Burrell, Willis, Elizabeth wife of THOMAS STALLARD and James and their heirs.

Item - I give and bequeath to my daughter Jane LUTTRELL, and to her heirs forever the one sixth part of my slaves, the one sixth part of all my stock, and one hundred dollars, one bed and furniture, one bedstead and desk.

Item - I gave and bequeath to my daughter Peggy LUTTRELL, and to her heirs forever the one sixth part of my slaves, the one sixth part of all my stock, and bed, bedstead, and furniture for said bed, and desk, a saddle and bridle.

All my property that is not mentioned in this will is to be equally divided between my wife and children. My wife is to be provided with a sufficient quantity of pork, corn, and ect. to last her family twelve months after my death.

It is my wish that my son Thomas LUTTRELL, is sent to school five years, his schooling and board to be paid out of my estate.
