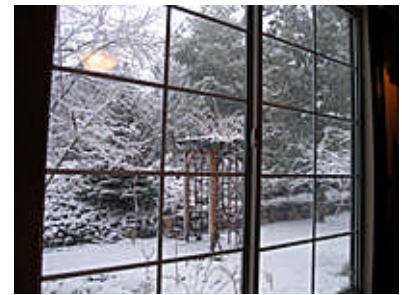

Creating the file: If you are using FamilyTreeMaker select the eldest Hawkins ancestor for the "Family Page", select "Outline Descendant Tree," then at the top select "File". Under File select "Copy/Export Individuals in Outline Descendant Tree." This will copy to a file only the information on those individuals in the descent tree. The file can then be emailed to me as an attachment. If you are using different software, please send a ".ged" file (almost all genealogy software programs can be converted/saved as a "GED file).

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Preservation Tip of the Month--Tipping-in Loose Pages by Becky Schipper

Tipping in loose pages requires the following materials.

\*PVA Adhesive

\*Wax Paper

\*Straight Edge

\*Exacto Knife

The page to be tipped-in may need to be trimmed to fit back into the book unobtrusively. If there is enough margin it is best to trim the inner edge of the page. Place a small bead of adhesive along the inner edge of the page. Align the page top, bottom, and front edge with the text block. Rub down if needed. Place wax paper on both sides to keep any adhesive from adhering to the pages next to the added one. Place a weight on the book and allow it to dry. Materials needed to do tip-ins are available from library supply catalogs and most craft stores. Try looking at online office, library, and art supply sites as well.

### **Tips from the Pros: Read the Back of the Tombstone from George G. Morgan**

When conducting on-site cemetery research, be sure to read the entire tombstone. Not everything on a tombstone is carved on the front. It is not unusual to find inscriptions on both the front and back of a stone and even on the edges. You may find the name and vital date on the face, an epitaph or poem on the back, the names of spouse, parents, children, and other information carved elsewhere. Look for initials, names, and/or the company name of the stonemason on the stone. Often the carver chiseled his initials or mark into a stone as a form of advertisement. His family may have been engaged in the stonecutting industry for generations and may have retained many or all of the family's work or account files. You may be able to research the carver and therefore locate other records concerning the person who ordered and paid for the tombstone, its date of installation, and other data.

Old pictures, family stories, unanswered questions, brick walls, whatever would be of interest to our line, to your part of the line, or information on a particular event that might have been an influencing factor in the history of an ancestor (s). If you send pictures please scan at 300 dpi, and furnish the who/when/where/why to the extent you can.
