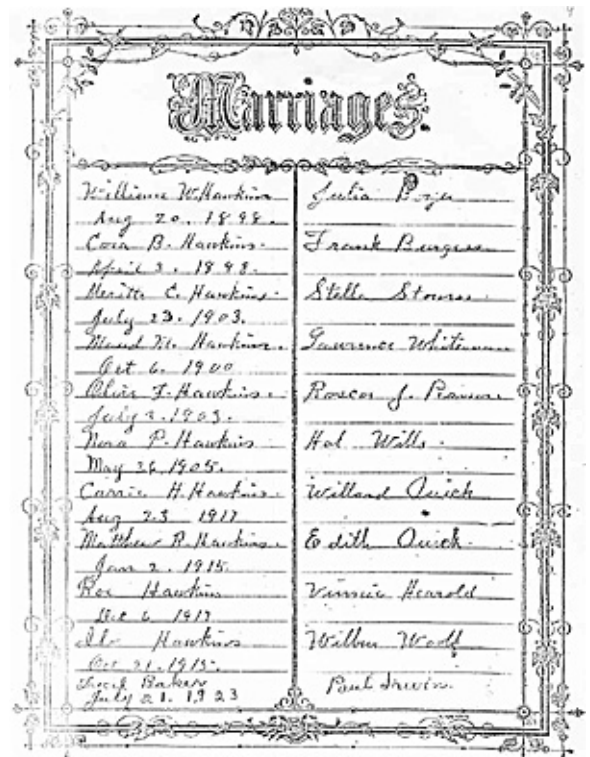

Poignant search for uncle.

For most people the Battle of Fromelles is just another bloody war story they learned about at school. For Justin Bourke of Avoca Beach the site of the notorious battle could be a life changing event. As the reburial of Australian and British World War 1 soldiers discovered near Pheasant Wood on Fromelles outskirts continues, Mr Bourke is getting ready to follow in the footsteps of his uncle Private Harold Bourke. Justin Bourke will attend the official opening of a new cemetery honouring the men killed during the Battle of Fromelles on July 19, 1916.

Described as the worst battle in Australian military history with 5533 casualties recorded in just 24 hours, Pte Bourke was reported missing in action on the night of the battle. We know that he'd been lost over there and never found, so when I first heard of the search to find the lost Diggers I looked into his records and contacted the army Mr Bourke said.

In November last year the father of two submitted DNA in the hope that his uncle might be among the 191 soldiers thought to have been recovered by German soldiers and buried in the unmarked grave. "It's a funny feeling to think that after all this time we might have found him," Mr Bourke said. "Harold was 22 when he was killed. I have a son, 22 and to think that my grandmother sent him off to war then, never to see him again or know what happened to him is just a terrible thing. They were only young boys who signed up and had no idea

what they were in for."

Identification: AN official identification board will start considering next month which soldiers can be named based on DNA results as well as archaeological, anthropological and historical evidence relating to the soldiers found. Regardless of the results Mr Bourke and his wife will travel to France for the official opening of the (Pheasant Wood) Military Cemetery in July.

*Out of 191 soldiers it is possible that there would be at least one Hawkins. I will contact the Australian and British war graves commission and get back to for next month. Bob Hawkins

Technology Tip of the Month--Photo Restoration with Adobe Photoshop, Version 9.02: Color Correction by Kay Spears

Restoration of color photographs is a little more complicated than restoring black and white photographs, and here's why: there is a difference between RGB and CMYK. RGB, or Red-Green-Blue, are the primary colors of your computer monitor and they are defined by light. At some point, you will want to print that photograph. The problem with printing the vibrant color you see on your screen is that it will be printed with CMYK colors. CMYK, or Cyan-Magenta-Yellow-Black, are the primary colors defined by printer ink. And printer ink is made up of dyes and pigments, not light, so the colors that were perfect on screen will be different when printed. What you see on your computer monitor is not necessarily what you will get.

Having said that, this is what I suggest. Treat problems such as scratches, watermarks, cracks, pencil marks, etc., basically the same way you would on black and white photographs. You will use the same tools: Clone, Feather, Layer and Contrast. However, if the problem is a discoloration of the photo, then you need to be fairly knowledgeable in the use of Photoshop. You should familiarize yourself with the different Adjustment Layers and Color Channels. The Adjustment Layers can be found on the menu bar under Image>Adjustments or among the drop-down selections along the bottom of the Layers Palette. To access the Color Channels, click the Channels tab on the Layers Palette.

Another tool I use for color adjustment is the Exposure Adjustment tool, located on the menu bar: Image>Adjustments>Exposure. When this dialog box is open, you have the options to change the Exposure, Offset or Gamma of a photograph. Take time to experiment with all of these tools and learn their capabilities. However, I recommend that you print out the photograph after each repair to see how the change you made will appear when printed. Eventually, you'll learn how to handle the color discrepancy between your monitor and your printer. And don't forget that everyone else's monitor and printer will produce different results than yours.

I recommend a marvelous book called "Adobe Photoshop Restoration & Retouching" by Katrin Eismann. This resource is full of detail, so don't let it be daunting. I've found it invaluable when I've been stumped on how to fix a problem color photograph.

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Wonder about the numbering of the Family Groups? Simply the order that a participant was first matched to another participant. Family Group-01 was started when two participants were a match (set 1), 02 were the second two participants to match that were different than 01. There were three sets formed before I had a match creating my Group-04. Currently we have established 17 unrelated sets/groups.

A wonderful resource for research on WHERE our ancestor lived is the on-line digital maps held in the collection of the United States Congressional Library, <http://www.loc.gov/library/libarch-digital.html> and <http://memory.loc.gov/ammem/index.html>.

I would like to share a small gem that I found a couple of years ago on the site that explains exactly where my 3-gr-grandfather, Thomas R. Hawkins, lived much of his life. I knew that he lived on the North Anna River in a place called Mallory's Ford because the information in the obituary of his son said: "E.P. Hawkins was the only son of Thomas R. Hawkins of Mallory's Ford, Virginia...." I also knew that he was a tanner by trade as the 1870 census lists his occupation as both Baptist Preacher and also tanner. So I was ecstatic to find a Civil War era map in the Civil War collection at the Library of Congress showing exactly where he lived (lower right corner).



The map is described: Survey of Orange County, Virginia / made under the direction of A.H. Campbell, Capt. Prov. Eng. & Pr. Top. Dep. by Lieut. Isard [sic], C.S.P.E.; traced from a map now in progress, April 1863; approved April 8th 1863 by Albert H. Campbell, Capt. Prov. Engr., Chief Top. Dep.

A very interesting aside is that Dot Hawkins whose son is a DNA match for my father in Hawkins DNA group #1 told me the following when I shared the map with her: "The 'southern branch' of this Hawkins clan

does have some tanners among them. Our 'orphan' grandson of Benjamin Hawkins of Buncombe County, NC, was a tanner in GA before moving to AL."

This is perhaps a coincidence, but on the other hand perhaps it is a huge clue. I challenge any of the other Hawkins DNA group #1 matches to see if there are any tanners among their ancestors. [From Marsha Moses]

I recently was able to locate and copy the will of William Hawkins of Orange Co., VA dated 30th Dec 1789. It states to the best of my ability to translate: I leave to my beloved wife Elizabeth one third part of my land. After her death or marriage to return to my four beloved children William Hawkins, Reuben Hawkins, Elisha Hawkins, Arculus Hawkins. First I leave unto my son Reuben all of my land from the Flat Run to the upper line. Also, after paying my debts & burial expenses I leave unto my son John Hawkins one coin worth 40 schillings, also I leave unto my daughter Mary Mankspile wife of Adam Mankspile formerly the wife of John Watson one coin worth forty schillings. Then I leave unto my sons William Hawkins, Reuben Hawkins & Elisha Hawkins all the remains of my living both real & personal. Only my son Elisha to be deducted out of twenty pounds of his part for land I gave him before. This last will & testament was proved on the 28th day of October 1799. This will was challenged in court & I will submit that next month.

This month I am listing what I have on Jonathan Hawkins, the fourth son of James and Martha (Hollowell). Next month I hope to do the same, in turn, with the remaining brothers, Nathan, James, Amos, and William. Do you have any information that you can help me with?

I do not have a lot on these brothers, and almost nothing on some. I would appreciate any information that any of you have. Also, are there any old pictures in these lines? If you have one please contact me.

Jonathan, son of James & Martha (Hollowell) Hawkins

"Jonathan dis 23-2-1765, quarrelling with Nathan POTTS in 11 mo-1764." (Hinshaw, Vol VI, p.504, Fairfax, VA MM.)

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Jonathon is the only one of James's & Martha's children that seems to not have been given a gct to SC. His mother Martha's (and her minor children) gct to Kershaw Co., SC was dated 26-4-1766. His brothers John & Isaac received gcts to Bush River MM, SC dated 30-5-1767. Was he never reinstated? Did he stay in VA?

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From the will of Jonathon's father James, Union County, South Carolina, recorded in Will Book No. 1, page 9, proven 1 April 1793.

Item 1 [of 7]. I give and demise unto my son Isaac Hawkins one tract of land containing one hundred acres which was granted to Jonathan Hawkins to have and to hold to him his Heirs and assigns, forever.

[cont.] It is my will that all the lands mentioned in this Will, except the first hundred acres which was granted to Jonathan Hawkins, shall be valued and if any of my children shall have more than their share that they pay to such of my children as have not had their share; for it is my will that my estate may be equally divided amongst them. Share and share alike.

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Referring to the will of Jonathan's father, it would seem that Jonathan had come to SC. Can we conclude that Jonathan died without issue prior to his father's death?

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If you have anything else on Jonathan (or differences) please share with me.

I am very happy that Group 7 is gaining "cousins". A couple of our newest DNA cousins have made a connection with John and Zachariah Hawkins in No. Carolina. Hope the rest of us can fit our families in with them. If anyone has suggestions for Group 7, please feel free to let me know. My ancestors start out in Virginia and then go to Tennessee. Another member starts in Tennessee and now we have No. and So. Carolina in with our very own "Hawkins Puzzle". At least we are mobile - no stay at home Hawkins' in our membership!!!

This is a repeat but maybe some one could give a new or better direction. What I have found is (1) Benjamin Hawkins b. ca 1705 d. 1771 in Prince Edward Co. VA. His wife was Mary Wade (?) (2) Benjamin Hawkins b. ca 1740 d 1777 in Prince Edward Co. Va. His wife was Amey unknown. My direct line is his son Robert Hawkins b. ca 1766 P. E. Co. d. 1840 in Sumner Co. TN. His first wife was Elizabeth. Robert sold a piece of land in Prince Edward Co. VA to his brother Benjamin Hawkins (3) b. 1770. The deed states that this was land Robert's father Benjamin (2) left to him. Robert's son Robert Hawkins b. 1805 in VA and d. 1865 in Nashville, Davidson Co. TN. My Great Grandfather (son of Robert (1805) was Thomas James Hawkins b. 1830 in Nashville and d. 1880 in Nashville. He is buried in the Old City Cemetery in Nashville.

The name that may be the connecting ancestor is John Hawkins. I have found a deed that both John Hawkins and Benjamin Hawkins (1705) witnessed in Prince Edward Co. VA. There is a John Hawkins who had several deed activities in Lunenburg Co. VA and a John Hawkins Jr. Later a John Hawkins in Granville N.C. bought land in Prince Edward that was patent to Mary Hawkins and a Francis Wyatt. John Hawkins and John Hawkins Jr. are involved in several activities in Granville/Bute Co. N. C. John Hawkins later shows up in Darlington S. Carolina. This may be the Jr. I have no prove, just following the names and guessing on the ages. I do have more in depth information that I can share if any one sees a possible connection or have any knowledge of these men in their research.
