Technology Tip of the Month--Creating and Using Color Channels in Adobe Elements by Kay Spears

In a previous article, I mentioned the ability to correct photographs using the “layers channel,” a feature only available in Adobe Photoshop. Well, I have found a way to duplicate this fix using Adobe Elements. A few extra steps are required, but the results are almost the same.

Open the image you would like to correct, then go to your Layers palette, right click on Background and choose Layer From Background. When the New Layer dialog box appears, name the layer blue. Then right click on the blue thumbnail on your Layers palette and choose Duplicate Layer. Name that layer green. Then right click on the green thumbnail, choose Duplicate Layer and name it red. You should have three layers in your Layers palette: Red, Green, and Blue.

Next, in your Layers palette, click on the red layer and go to Menu>Enhance>Adjust Lighting>Levels, or press “Ctrl+L” on your key board. Either of these methods will open your Levels dialog box. You should see a Channel drop down box. The default setting will be RGB. Click on the drop down arrow and choose red. While you are still in the dialog box, locate the slider bar under the Input Levels Chart and move the white slider on the far right all the way over to the left. Your image should be red. Click ok.

Now go to the green layer, and repeat the same steps, but choose green instead of red. Click ok. Then, repeat the process on the blue layer. When you finish these steps, the large image in your workspace will be red, but your Layers palette will have red, green and blue thumbnail images. The thumbnail layer at the top of the list in your Layers palette will be displayed in your workspace.

Check the quality of the red image, and then turn it off by clicking on the “eye” to the left of the thumbnail image. The next layer on the list will display. In a similar fashion, check and compare the quality

of the image for each layer. After you decide which layer looks best, discard the other two by dragging them to the trash can located on the Layers palette. (It may be in a different location depending on the version of Elements you have.)

Lastly, to remove the color from your image go to Image>Mode>Grayscale. When asked if you want to discard color information, say ok. At this point, you will have a black and white image which you can tweak a little more, as needed. If desired, you can add the color back in by going to Image>Mode>RGB.

### Using RootsWeb By Joan Young

Last month's tip contained information about the RootsWeb message boards and how to get the most from proper use of the surname box. Judging from comments that came to my mailbox or were posted on lists, RootsWeb users need help in the following areas:

- 1) *Updating e-mail addresses on old messages posted on the boards*: Posting on the message boards has required registration for several years and any posts you have made since the registration requirement are linked to your registration status. If you go to MyAccount and update your e-mail address or other account information (such as a change of name) this will update all board posts associated with your username(s). Older posts may be updated in some cases also. If you have more than one username, all will be updated in this manner provided the usernames are all linked to your account at RootsWeb's secure site.
- 2) *Finding existing posts you have made to message boards*: Finding your old posts enables you to check to see if your posts require editing or removal (hopefully followed by replacement with an updated post). Many users are apparently unaware that they can click the VIEW POSTS link on any board message for their username to bring up a list of all posts they made under that username. Very recent posts may not be found if your messages were posted after the latest search engine indexing of boards. So don't be surprised or confused if you don't find brand new posts in a search, they will, eventually, be indexed and searchable.

I thought that this month being the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the start of the Civil War that I would share some info on my ancestor Benjamin Franklin Hawkins. On Nov. 30, 1863 Benjamin along with several of his neighbors enlisted in the Union Army at Union City, TN. His enlistment card lists him as: Age-20, Height-5'10", Complexion-Fair, Eyes-Blue, Hair-Light. He was attached to the 6<sup>th</sup> Tennessee Cavalry as a Blacksmith under Major William E. Bradford. Benjamin left a pregnant wife at home and in early February 1864 was notified that his wife was very ill. He asked for leave, but was refused. On February 13, 1864 Benjamin left without leave and headed home to care for his pregnant wife. On February 28, 1864 Nancy E. Hawkins was born. During the time that Benjamin was absent his unit was dispatched to Ft. Pillow. On April 12, 1864 Maj. Gen. Nathan Bedford Forrest and approximately 2,500 troops attacked Ft. Pillow. What ensued was later called the Massacre at Ft. Pillow. Maj. Bradford and about 295 of the troops stationed at Ft. Pillow died. Some say that many of them including Maj. Bradford were executed after surrendering. What makes this more interesting is that half of the troops stationed at Ft. Pillow were black and members of the 6<sup>th</sup> US Colored Heavy Artillery under Maj. Lionel Booth. Booth was also killed. Of the

casualties at Ft. Pillow the majority were black. The controversy continues today! In 1997 a movie with Tom Selleck entitled "Last Stand at Saber River" was made about the massacre. In the meantime Benjamin was at home caring for his wife and new baby. He later recalled Union troops coming to the house looking for him. Sometimes when the deserters were found they were executed. Benjamin was not found and decided to return to service. He returned on Sept. 18, 1864 and was assigned to the 14<sup>th</sup> TN Cavalry. He was restored to active duty and mustered out at the conclusion of the war. Because of his voluntary return all pay and benefits were restored. He later was eligible for and received a pension from the US. Benjamin had 2 half brothers and 2 brothers in law that fought for the Confederacy. The 2 half brothers were killed. One at Shiloh and the other at New Hope Church, GA. The 2 brothers in law fought at Missionary Ridge. One was killed and the other taken prisoner of war. Benjamin died on Jan. 29, 1929 in Union City, TN.

Sharon Sue (Wilcox) Hawkins, suffering the results of peritoneal cancer, departed this earthly life Friday, April 15, 2011 from her residence in Mansfield, Texas.

The 5<sup>th</sup> child of Eula (nmi) Kimble and James Homer Wilcox, she was born 04 December 1933 in Kokomo, Howard County, IN. She graduated in May 1951 from Sharpville High School, Tipton Co., IN.

Sharon married Phillip Ardath Hawkins 08 August 1953 in the Methodist Church in Sharpville, and the marriage produced two sons, Phillip Mark and Stephen Douglas.

A homemaker and mother, Sharon also served for 20 years as the vice-president of Falcon Crest Wood Products, Inc., a family owned business. Confirmed in the Episcopal faith in 1970 in Dallas, TX, she was very active in the church, singing soprano in the choir, serving as president of the women of the church, serving as the

buyer for the gift shop, chairing St. Martha's Guild, participating in the Stained Glass Guild, acting as a Diocesan representative, and numerous other activities.

She had many interests, including; needlework, gardening, porcelain dolls, stained glass, and square and round dancing where she served in numerous club and North Texas Square & Round Dance Association activities. She had traveled extensively throughout the world.

Mrs. Hawkins is survived by her husband Phillip, her sons Stephen in Mansfield, TX and Phillip and wife Maria with children Kristopher Thomas and Kaelyn Marie in Reno NV, also a grandson Stuart Joseph and wife Stephanie and great-granddaughter Peyton in Dallas, TX, sisters Betty and husband Wendell Fenn in Tucson, AZ, Viola Allison in Potterville, MI, and brothers James & wife Sharon of Sharpsville, IN, Henry of Kokomo, IN and Timothy & wife Susanna of The Villages, FL. Her mother, father, and a brother Kenneth preceded her in death.

At her request the remains will be cremated. A visitation for family and friends will be held Sunday evening from 5 to 7, in the Parish Hall, St. Gregory's Episcopal Church, 1091 Country Club Dr., Mansfield, TX. A requiem Eucharist will be at St Gregory's on Monday morning at, 11 AM, followed by interment in the DFW National Cemetery, departing the lane "C" holding point at 1:45 PM.

Provincial Court Proceedings of Maryland, 1658. Know all Men by these presents that I John Hawkins of New England Marriner have sold unto Thomas Davis one Maid servant for three years, her name is Elizabeth Frame and she doth promise and bind herself to serve the said Davis, his heirs or Assigns truly, the full term of time mentioned, and for the true performance hereof, the said Hawkins is to give her a Cow Calfe, as speedily as he can, and to the true performance hereof we have hereunto set our hands, November the 8<sup>th</sup> day 1656.

Witness us	John Hawkings
Thomas Nadey	Eliz. u u fframe

Provincial Court Proceedings of Maryland, 1657. Whereas Thomas Davis arrested to this Court a maid Servant named Elizabeth fframe, which servant the said Davis bought of John Hawkins for three years, and the said servant alledging that she is free, and that she will make it so appear in March Court next, The Court doth order that the suit be referred until the Court in March and that the said Elizabeth do put in Security then to appear in this suit, and by proof to make it manifest that she is free, or else to make good such damage as the said Davis hath sustained herein.

Robert Harwood aged 29 years or thereabouts swore and examined sayeth that he is this deponent being in Mr. Thomas davis his house about November last was twelve month William Kempe did buy Elizabeth fframe of Mr. John hawkins, for Mr. Thomas Davis his use and employments, and the said Mr. Hawkins upon selling the said maid servant said unto her, Bess is you will serve Mr. Davis the other half year, I will give you a Cow Yearling, and the said Elizabeth replied yes, and farther this deponent sayeth not. Signed Robert R. H. Harwood

Upon the Petition of Thomas Davis against Elizabeth fframe. The said Davis alledging that the said Elizabeth had time remaining of her service to him. Elizabeth, the defendant, replying that she had not received of her master according to Covenant and further that she was a servant, when she made the latter condition with the said Davis, as appeareth by the Oath of Adam Staveley verifying the same upon Oath in open Court. The Court thereby Judgeth that the said Elizabeth be set free from the said Davis, without further obligation of Service. And the said Davis is left to have his damage against John Hawkings, who made the condition. Concerning the said Elizabeth, with the said Davis, and so Ordered accordingly.



And the said Elizabeth claiming cloathes according to the custom of the Country. It is Ordered likewise that the said Davis shall pay her Cloathes, according to the custom of the Country, upon demand, as being her last Master.

Adam Staveley aged 30 years or thereabouts swore and examined in open Court this 29<sup>th</sup> of December 57 sayeth that he this deponent coming from Manadoes to Rapahanock with John Hawkins to Rice Jones his house, the said Mr. Hawkins had then an man servant, who had a year and a half to serve, and the said Hawkins being willing to exchange the said man servant for a maid servant, Elizabeth fframe living in that house, and being willing to be bought by the said Hawkins having but one year or near upon to serve, the said Hawkins told the said Elizabeth that he would not buy her without she would make up the time which his man had to serve to which the said Elizabeth agreed, and upon that account the said Elizabeth agreed, and upon that account the said Hawkins exchanged his man servant for the said Elizabeth Frame. And the said Hawkins coming up the Bay told the said Elizabeth that she would be free in a bad time of the year, and the said Hawkins asked her, what he should give her...

### Bits and Pieces of the Hawkins Family Puzzle by Mildred Showalter Farmer Continued from the last issue.

The following is from Dorothy Hawkins of California. Her husband is a descendant of this family.

John, the son of Captain Thomas and Mary Lucas married 1. Elizabeth and 2. Grace Stallard. Children by Elizabeth and John were Thomas who married Ann Covington and William who married Margaret ---. Mary married John Boutwell and Elizabeth married James Reynolds.

A list of names of children of William and Margaret is given on pg. 32, and he was given the blacksmith's tools in his father's will.

Thomas, son of John Hawkins was b. ca 1697 and married Ann Covington

whose father was Richard Covington who died in 1739. His will was probated in Dec. in Essex CO. Richard Covington was married to Ann Young.

Thomas and Ann Covington Hawkins had children named in his will: Young, who married Margaret Miller, Nancy, Lucy, Mary, Hannah and Betty.

Young Hawkins died in Dec. 1765. His wife was the widow of Simon Miller and their children were: Thomas, b. 1751, d. 1822. William, Catsby and Fanny Thomas son of Young had a son named Young by his wife Elizabeth Powell. She was b: ca 1757 in Brunswick CO., VA. Young Jr. was married to Elizabeth Alcock on Nov. 16, 1804.

Thomas Hawkins, b. 1751 in Essex CO.;VA was the son of Young Hawkins and his wife Margaret. Thomas married Elizabeth Powell in Amherst CO. VA on Mar. 5, 1771. He died in Nelson CO.VA on Feb. 1, 1822.

Elizabeth Powell was b. ca 1757 in Brunswick CO., VA and died in Nelson CO., in 1832. Her father was Lucas Powell who was married to Elizabeth Edwards.

Thomas and Elizabeth had children: John who mar. Martha (Patsy) Martin on Oct. 29, 1799 in Amherst CO.,VA. He died on April 16, 1849 in Nashville, Davidson CO., TN. He is buried in the Old City Cemetery. They had children: Lucas, Willis, John, Rebecca, Elizabeth, Thomas and James Marion.

Lucas was b. Mar. 8, 1803 in Amherst CO., VA. He mar. Eleanor Hardy on May 7, 1829 in Bedford CO., VA. He died on Nov. 3, 1889 in Williamson CO., TN.

Willis N. was b. in 1802 in Amherst CO. He mar. Elizabeth Saunders on Mar. 13, 1834 in Nashville, TN. His death occurred on Feb. 21, 1849 and he is buried in the Old City Cemetery in Nashville.

Rebecca Hawkins b. May.1,1805 in Amherst CO. mar. Edmund R. Harrison on Nov. 10, 1828 in Wilson CO. TN. She died there in 1890.

Elizabeth Hawkins was b. in Amherst CO. and mar. John Hawk on Jul. 20, 1832 in Wilson CO., TN.

Thomas P. Hawkins mar. Eliza R, Scoby on Oct. 15, 1836 in Wilson CO., TN. He died in 1875 in Madison, MO.

James Marion Hawkins b. Nov. 18, 1821 in Virginia mar. May 14, 1846 in Nashville Elizabeth Siglar. He died on Aug. 30, 1884 in Nashville, TN.

Margaret Noel Hawkins dau. of Thomas Hawkins and Elizabeth Powell was b. on Oct. 8, 1780 in Amherst CO., VA and died June 27, 1863. She was mar. to Lunsford Loving on Jan. 6, 1801 in Amherst. She died in Nelson CO.,VA.

Young Hawkins, who mar. Elizabeth Allcock died in 1846 in Nelson CO.

Elizabeth Hawkins, dau. of Thomas and Elizabeth was b. in 1790 in Amherst. She mar. Spencer Faulconer on Jan. 25, 1805 in Amherst.

Lucas Powell Hawkins died in 1815 in Nelson, CO.,VA.

Nathaniel Hawkins was b. ca 1775 in Amherst CO. He mar. Penelope - and probably died in Davidson CO. TN.

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William Hawkins mar. Cornelia Skinner and died probably in KY.  
Nathan Hawkins son of Nicholas of Spotsylvania was given land by his father shortly before Nicholas died in 1754. His brother Alexander was a witness. Nathan married Catherine--- and moved to Kentucky. A will probated

in Lincoln, CO.,KY in 1794 reads " to Daughter Elizabeth Lovel, Mary Stevenson Nancy Schooler, to son Nicholas, Great Bible, ect. in consideration of trouble he had moving me and my family here in 1789. He enabled to pay on land in Bourbon. Wife Catherine, son Nathan, dau. Marcy, son Simon, dau. Margaret Bernet, dau. Elizabeth. "

On July 2, 1799, Nathan and wife Frances sold in Madison CO.,KY to Thomas Waller of Spotsylvania CO.,VA for \$110. for 55 acres in Spotsylvania CO. In Will Bk. 19, pg. 434 in Mercer CO.,KY we find written : Apr. 14, 1836

a will- Nathan's wife Francis is mentioned and children: Thomas, Jarvis, Abraham, Nathan Jr., Katherine Futnish, Sally and Elizabeth.

Nathan's first wife was Ann Hayden dau. of Jarvis Hayden who died in 1780. In 1794 Nathan relinquished all rights to his father irdaw's estate.

Nathan Jr. son of Nathan and Ann mar. Margaret Burn in Mercer CO.,KY on Dec. 7, 1824.

Nathan gave a deposition at age 74 in Madison County concerning his brother John's wife's slave girl Milly. John was mar. to Elizabeth Ellis.

Nicholas Hawkins who was b. ca 1582 in Plymouth, England came to Virginia after his father William died in England. He came with his mother, Mary Halse Hawkins who brought her children with her. A very old book written by Richard Gentry, a descendant of Nicholas Hawkins states " It is generally believed and almost certain that this branch of the family is descended from William Hawkins , a famous Sea Captain, was was the father of Sir John Hawkins and William, his brother." William and Marie Halse

had a son Nicholas b. in 1582 and baptized at St. Andrew's Church in Plymouth. Admiral Sir John had a grandson Nicholas b.at Slapton on Mar 31, 1639.

Robert Hawkins ( wife Jane) of Beddeford, also a descendant of the Admiral, mentions in his will, his brothers Thomas and Nicholas.

Nicholas Hawkins b. 1716 in Spottsylvania CO. VA mar. Mary Miller, widow of Thomas Miller in 1737...Index Of Old Marriages of Old Rappahannock and Essex Counties VA. Nicholas Hawkins Jr. of Spottsylvania CO.

VA mar. Elizabeth Long , dau of John Long and Elizabeth....

Nicholas who mar. Elizabeth died on Nov. 13, 1763 and left wife Elizabeth and

son John as executors of his will. He mentions Legitimate son John, dau. Cate Mcdonal, son Thomas, son Nicholas, son Alexander and daughter Ann Pritchett and grandson Hawkins Cosel.

Nicholas Hawkins son of Nicholas left in his will on Feb. 15, 1744 to sons, John , Nathan and Thomas.

A Nicholas Hawkins who married Ann--- died in Boyle CO. KY. He lived in Rockbridge CO. VA before moving to Madison CO., KY. He owned many slaves and much property and was a veteran of the War of 1812. His daughter Martha mar. Samuel McDowell and they had 5 sons: Joseph, Charles, Nicholas, b. Feb. 6, 1834, Samuel and William. Nicholas Mc Dowell m. Maria Hawkins Harvey, dau. of Martha Borden Hawkins Harvey and Benjamin Hawkins.

Nicholas Hawkins.Jr. of Spotsylvania, CO.,VA had a son Thomas b. 1765 and d. between 1833 and 1840. He married Mary Stanley and they had nine children: Betsy, Martha, Hulda, Mary Ann, John, William, Joseph, James Harvey and Benjamin.

James Harvey married in 1829, Francis Penbleton and had ten children: Lucy, Sally, Betty, Martha, Hulda, Cordelia, Isabella, Eliza., Alex. B., John.

The information on his family (from Nicholas Jr) came from Lester and Geraldine Hawkins who live on a beautiful farm in Spotsylvania County. Lester's ancestors owned the property during the Civil War. It is located near the Wilderness Church and was the scene of a battle. Mrs. Hawkins writes this story: "Let me tell you a little story about the old maids Lucy, Sally, Betty, Martha, Hulda and Beth who lived here during the Civil War. They told them there was to be a battle - they took off to the woods and a cannon ball went right through one of the hoop skirts and didn't touch her. They also cared for a wounded yankee soldier who died and is buried out back of our house. (small cemetery)."

Lester and Geraldine are a friendly, young looking couple. We would all like to claim them as cousins.

Lester's grandfather was John Thomas, son of James Harvey and Frances Pembleton. He was b. in 1830 and died in 1918. In 1879, he married Marie Taliaferro Tanner who was b. in 1849 and died in 1929. They had six children: Aubrey, b. Jan. 9, 1880 and d. in Oct. 1965. He married Agnes Taylor on Dec. 22, 1918 and they had two children, Aubrey who has a child Jane and Charles b. Jan. 22, 1924. He has three children: Charles Taylor Jr. and two girls.

Joseph Collins, son of John Thomas, was b. Sept. 17, 1881 and d. May 20, 1968. He married Lena Fitzhugh, b. Oct. 1886. Their marriage date is Aug. 28, 1907. Their children are: Joseph, b.
