SHUBAEL came to Canada as a lad in 1810 accompanied by Peter Vrooman one of whose daughters later married one of Foster's sons. They came in by way of Cape Vincent and Kingston and worked their way up the Bay. It is told that after leaving Kingston they spent the night in an Indian shanty and awoke next morning to find their clothing frozen to the floor. Finally they came to what is now Belleville and were employed at what was then the stirring village of Canniff's Mills now Cannifton, and in the absence of rail connections past all its industrial glories. The Canniffs were from Adolphustown but not of the Vanalstine colony, therefore, like the Shubael Foster family may trace to Pilgrim ancestors or Colonial dames, or even Norman blood, they are Loyalists only by indirection. We say this because Shubael on May 19th, 1812, was married by Rev. Robert McDowall to Phoebe the daughter of John Canniff and Elizabeth (Miller) Roblin. Therein is found the Loyalist strain of the purest kind.
