This will should be read in conjunction with several other pieces of evidence:

- The notes by Sir William Betham regarding the estate of Rebecca Spierin (nee Carter) who died intestate in Ireland and whose will was proven at the Dublin Prerogative Court in 1680. He states that her next heir was Elizabeth Baynham.
- There is a marriage record for Elizabeth Spering and Isaac Baynham in May 1679 (St James', Paddington) and a burial record for an Izaac Baynham in Nov 1679 (St Andrew Undershaft).
- The Will below mentions the Pennington's and specifically Mary Pennington, wife of John Bramston, as well as their eldest daughter Sarah. This relationship between the Pennington's and the Spering's is fairly well delineated and a common ancestry back to George Spering and Elizabeth Hanbury can be established between Elizabeth Baynham and Mary Bramston (nee Pennington). This suggests that this Elizabeth Baynham is the same one described as the "next heir" of Rebecca Spering (nee Carter) in the 1680 grant above.

However, nowhere in the will is there mention of any Spering's and specifically no mention of any connection with Ireland. It is possible that any lands she inherited were previously sold to her Spering relatives (were her siblings deceased already? Probably if she was the "next heir"). It is possible that further clues may lie in the wills of the other offspring of George Spering & Elizabeth Hanbury.

IN THE NAME OF GOD AMEN, I Elizabeth Baynham of the parish of St Botolph without Aldersgate<sup>1</sup> London widdow<sup>2</sup> being somewhat indisposed in health of body but of perfect mind and memory doe make and ordain this my last will and testament in the manner and forme following, IMPRIMIS, I will that all my Debts Legacies and funeral expenses be duly paid and discharged out of my personall estate as farr as the same will extend save what I have hereinafter specifically devised and I devise that my body may be decently interred in the parish Church of **St Andrew=under=shaft** as near my relacons [relations] as possibly may be at the discretion of my Executrix hereafter named. Also I give and bequeath unto my kinsman Thomas Pennington<sup>3</sup> the sume of one hundred pounds and my Executore. To **Elizabeth the wife of ffrancis Sherwood**<sup>4</sup> the sume of Tenn pounds. To her **daughter** ffrances the sume of ffifty pounds. To Sarah Stowe(?) ten pounds. To my Goddaughter Mary Stowe<sup>5</sup> fifty pounds. To Sarah Rice five pounds. To Sarah and John children of the said Sarah Rice<sup>6</sup> fforty shillings apiece, to Mary Andrews<sup>7</sup> fforty shillings, To my servant Martha the wife of William  $\sim$ " $\sim$ "~ffrancis five pounds six turkey(?) xxx xxx and a feather bed, to the poor of the parish of Cripplegate Tenn pounds, To the poor of the parish of Aldersgate five pounds to be distributed by the Ministers and Churchwardens of the said respective parishes in such manner as they shall think fit, Allsoe I give and bequeath unto my kinswoman Mary the wife of John Bramston of Chigwell<sup>8</sup> in
