

Daring Robbery.—The residence of Mr. E. C. Thomas, North Calhoun street, near Saratoga, was the scene of a daring robbery about 4 o'clock yesterday morning. The thieves effected an entrance into the premises through the kitchen window, by forcing it open with "jimmies." They then made a general ransacking through the house. They procured a trunk and packed in it silver-wares and other articles, including two albums—from these they removed the pictures. One of the thieves called out from the second-story window to a companion in the yard to come up and help him down with a chest which he had loaded with booty. This awakened a servant girl, who gave the alarm. Mr. Thomas gave an alarm from the front window of his bed chamber, but the thieves escaped, dropping, however, the loaded trunk in the yard. A number of articles were missing from the premises, the value of which was not ascertained.

Sold Robbers.—On Sunday night the house of Mr. Peter Hoover, at Calverton, two miles from the city, was entered by four men and robbed of fourteen dollars and a trunk of clothing. Mr. H. is an aged man, and he did not resist the thieves, but as soon as they left he gave an alarm and some of the neighbors started in pursuit. A shot was fired at them, when they dropped the trunk and effected their escape. A few night prior to the above the house of Mr. Wm. J. H. Cole, in the same village, was entered by the same party, who demanded his money. He answered that there was none of consequence in the house, but they thoroughly searched it, and kept Mr. C. and his wife quiet by threats of personal violence. They obtained there a few dollars and left without attempting to remove anything else.

Board of Public School Commissioners.—The regular weekly meeting of the board of Public School Commissioners was held yesterday afternoon, George N. Eaton, president, in the chair. Bills to the amount of \$1,022.54 were reported correct and ordered to be paid. A communication was received from Miss S. A. Mitchell, asking for a position as teacher. Bills to the amount of \$6 were remitted, the parties being unable to pay. Miss Emma R. G. Cook was elected an assistant teacher in female primary school No. 16. The board adjourned until Tuesday next.

Charged with Theft.—Phillip Brown, colored, was arrested yesterday by policeman McCannley, charged with having stolen a lot of liquors, the property of Isaac Wilson. Justice Hiss held him to bail to await the action of the grand jury. Jesse R. Evans and M. Coyle were arrested yesterday by policemen Matthews and Morgan, on the charge of having robbed John Murphy of \$23. Justice Hiss committed them for the action of the grand jury.

Freight Bridge Washed Away.—The train which was to have left the depot on the Northern Central railway at nine o'clock last night for York and Harrisburg did not leave, in consequence of a bridge four miles this side of York having been swept away by the freshet. The passengers, after going to the depot and hearing of the accident, returned to their hotels.

Another Robbery.—About noon on Monday last thieves entered the dwelling of Thomas Ockerme, No. 66 St. Paul street, and carried off a gold watch and chain, a gold breastpin, and other pieces of jewelry, and \$18 in money. They had a quantity of wearing apparel bundled up ready to carry off, but for some unknown cause left without it.

Called a Fellow Prisoner.—Charles H. McVey and Patrick McLaughlin were taken into custody at the eastern police station on Monday night, on the charge of having robbed a fellow prisoner named Joseph Vermonth of his pocket-book, containing \$15. Justice Whalen committed them for the action of the grand jury.

Infanticide.—The body of a white female infant was found yesterday morning lying on the corner of Baltimore and Calhoun streets. It was carried to the western police station, where Coroner Greentree held an inquest, the jury rendering a verdict of death from violence by the hands of some person or persons unknown to the jury.

Personal.—Major General Butler, Colonel Briggs and Major Mulford arrived here in the Norfolk boat yesterday morning, from Old Point, and proceeded to Washington, on business, it is supposed, connected with the exchange of prisoners. Major Mulford is in command of the flag of truce boat at Fortress Monroe.

Violation of City Laws.—John B. Willener was arrested yesterday by policeman Dougherty, charged with driving through the Lexington market during market hours. Justice Dryden fined him \$3 and costs.

Thomas Trill was arrested yesterday by policeman Young, charged with throwing stones in the street. Justice Dryden fined him \$1 and costs.

Charged with Stealing.—A Dorsey, colored, was arrested yesterday morning, charged with being accessory to the stealing of 59 yards of muslin, the property of Mrs. Caroline March, No. 76 Hanover street. Justice Johnson committed the accused to jail for court.

Took the Oath of Allegiance.—F. Jordan, recently a soldier in the Confederate service, appeared at the Military Provost Marshal's office yesterday, took the oath of allegiance, and was released.

Still-born.—Yesterday morning the body of a white male child was found at the corner of Ridge and Austin streets. Justice Johnson held an inquest, the jury rendering a verdict of "still-born."

Assault.—Lewis Schaner was arrested on Monday night by the police of the eastern district on the charge of having assaulted and struck William McNally on the head with a club. He was held to bail for trial.

Charged with Disloyalty.—Peter McKeeney was arrested yesterday by government detectives and locked up in the military prison to await trial upon the charge of disloyalty.

The Widening of Holliday Street.—The subject of widening Holliday street, between Baltimore and Fayette streets, has for some time attracted the attention of the city council and of the people. The corrected statement of the board of commissioners for opening streets shows a large range of benefits. The whole cost of the improvement will be \$99,422.55, the whole of which, except \$3,250, received for the sale of old materials in the bed of Holliday street, as proposed to be widened, is to be drawn from property on Baltimore, Fayette and Holliday streets.—The following is a list of the damages awarded: W. The whole number of exemptions of whom the second district was thirty-three, of whom twenty-seven were white and six were colored. Four paid commutation money, fourteen were physically disabled, three furnished substitutes, and eleven were exempted for other causes. In the third district there were forty-two exemptions, of whom thirty-three were white and nine were colored. Six paid commutation money, eleven were physically disabled, nine were aliens, seven were over age, and nine were exempted for other reasons.

Fatal Fall.—Yesterday afternoon one of the employees of warehouse No. 5 Commerce street discovered that the staple which secured the rope to the hoisting wheel had come out, and the rope had fallen into the cellar. He went down for the purpose of getting it to again put the fall in order for hoisting, and when he got into the cellar found the dead body of Thomas Crouch, a youth of fifteen years, who had been employed in the store. It appears that he was in the habit of coming down by the rope from the fourth story, and when last seen on Monday afternoon he was working on a pigeon box on the fourth floor. He had been talking of going to Washington, and yesterday morning, when he failed to make his appearance, it was supposed he had gone to Washington, and no further notice was taken of his absence. His pigeon box and tools were found just as he had been to work with them, and it was concluded that when he attempted to descend by the rope the staple crew out and he fell to the cellar, by which he was instantly killed. Coroner Sparks was summoned, but when the probable circumstances of death were explained, he declined to hold an inquest.

Another Change in the Weather.—The storm which began on Monday morning continued throughout the whole of yesterday morning, and for a part of the afternoon. There were several showers, but the temperature was mild until about four o'clock in the afternoon when the wind changed to the northwest. The mercury then began to fall, and at a late hour of the night the cold was more severe than for several days preceding. The late pleasant season, together with the rain, caused the breaking up of the ice in the river, and it is probable this morning will discover that nearly the whole of it has disappeared under the pressure of the high wind during the night.
