On this 17th day of October 1878
before me the undersigned one of the judges of the Circuit
Court for the State of Tennessee personally appeared
Thomas Brewinmet aged sixty four years Resident
in the County of Anderson in said State of Tennessee
who being by me first duly sworn according to
law doth in his oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the provision made by the late
Act of Congress entitled an Act to provide for
certain persons engaged in the Land and Naval
Service of the United States in the Revolutionary war.
That he the said Thomas Brewinmet entered in the
State of Virginia in the year 1777 in the company
commanded by Captain Cliff Shelton of the
10th Virginia Regiment in the regular service
for three years that he continued to serve the
United States said three years for which he entitles
and his monthly over and was then discharged
at Philadelphia by order of Genl. George Washington
that he has lost his discharge that he was in the
battle at Brandywine, at Monmouth and at
Red Bank, that he is in reduced circumstances and
needs the assistance of his country for support
that he has no other wages now in his possession of
his said services that he has never been a
pen sioner and does hereby relinquish all

claim to pensions heretofore provided for
recipients by the act of Congress under which
he was appointed

SCHEDULE.

STATE OF TENNESSEE, }
 Anderson COUNTY, } ss. July 10th 1820

On this 10th day of July 1820, personally appeared in open court, being a court of record, (having the power of fine and imprisonment and also having been made a court of record by the laws of said state,) for the said county, *Thomas Baumgart* aged *sixty five* years, resident in the county of *Anderson* aforesaid, who, being duly sworn, according to law, doth on his oath, declare that he served in the revolutionary war as follows: *That he enlisted in the year 1777 for 3 years in Captain Bluff Shelton's company of the 10th Virginia Regiment then commanded by Colonel Speer. That he is provided for under the Act of Congress of the 18th March 1818. That his original declaration is dated the 17th of October 1818 that his pension certificate is of N^o 5321.*

And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States, on the 18th day of March, 1818, and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property, or securities, contracts or debts, due to me; nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed.

Head of hog of the value of four dollars \$4

*That he is a farmer and not able to labor more than one fourth of his time; and that of an light or very nature with a no trade. That he has a wife and four children. His wife able to perform full labor - His eldest son William is aged about 18 years but unheathy and not able to perform full labor for one of that age - Sally a daughter aged about 8 years - Ann about 6 years - Thomas about 2 years in either of which last mentioned child are able to perform any labor to his value. The above four children on the wages of the family assisting with him amount to at least \$10. His property *Thomas Baumgart**

On this 7th day of August 1843 Personally came before the
County Court of Anderson County afore said Mary Brummitt
a Resident of said County aged Seventy seven years who
being first duly sworn according to law, doth on her
Oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain
the benefit of the provisions made by the act of Congress
passed July 7th 1838, entitled "an act granting half
pay and Pensions to certain Soldiers, that she is the
Widow of Thomas Brummitt, who was a Regular
Soldier of the United States in the Revolutionary
War and late a Pensioner she cannot specify
any Service he performed nor the County through
which he marched nor when he entered or
left the Service nor the Regiment to which he
belonged, but for all evidence necessary to establish
her claim she asks for Reference to be had
to the Pension papers of the said Thomas Brummitt
now on file as she is advised in the Pension Department
which she is advised will show the time he
entered and left the service, the County through which
he marched, the Regiment to which he belonged, and
the engagements in which he was if any
she further declares that she was married to the said
Thomas Brummitt in the Month of May 1793
in the County of Knox in the State of Tennessee
and that her maiden name been Mary Burris
and that the said Thomas Brummitt died on
the 20th day of November 1842
that she was not married to him prior to
his leaving the service but the Marriage took
place previous to the first day of January 1794

She cannot give the length of
service performed by her husband but in that
particular she would ^{for a long} like to be held to her Pension
papers as afore said, and for the length of service
established by him she claims a Pension
She has no documentary evidence

She has used Reasonable means
to procure a copy of "Marriage Records" it appears
from the certificate of the Clerk of Iron
County that the same cannot be found which
certificate is hereto annexed, she also offers
in support of her claim the affidavit of
Elyah Purris which shows that the Marriage
took place before 1794. all of which is

On this 14th day of February, in the year of our
Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty two personally appeared
before me an acting Justice of the Peace in and for the County and
State above mentioned. Mr. William Brummitt, of the County and
State above mentioned being first duly sworn according to Law, doth and he doth
make the following Declaration That he is the son and heir at Law
of Thomas Brummitt, deceased who was a pensioner of the United
States under the act of Congress, of June 7th 1832, at the rate of ninety
Six dollars per annum, for services in the war of the Revolution
in the Virginia Continental Line, that he was inscribed on the Roll
of the Knoxville Agency for paying pension in East Tennessee. That he
died on the twentyeth day of November eight hundred and forty
two, leaving a widow affiant's Mother, who made application for
a pension which application was suspended and that he now resides
the same, under the acts above stated, That his Mother Mary Brummitt
was married prior to the 1st of January one thousand seven hundred
and ninety four, for the proof of which he would refer you to the
proof filed by affiant's Mother, and now on file in the Department
Affiant further declares that he has often heard his Mother and father
say, that they were married at the time Carver's Station was
destroyed by the Indians in seven hundred and ninety three that
he would refer you to the proof on file for the same, Affiant further declares
that his Mother Mary Brummitt, died on the fifth day of November
1847 leaving the following named children as his only heirs at Law,
William Brummitt, Eliza Brummitt, J. A. Brummitt, Thom. Brummitt
Sarah, Braden Anna White, & Fintia Braetshaw, that they live in
Anderson County in the State of Tennessee Affiant makes this declaration
in order to obtain the arrears of pension due his Mother, from the
4th March 1843, to the 6th day of November 1847, the day of her death

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter of June 2, in which you furnish the name of Thomas Brummett, of Virginia and later Tennessee, as that of the soldier whose Revolutionary War record you desire, and in which you state that you are trying to learn the parentage of your great-grandfather, Banner Brummett, born in Bristol, Virginia, in 1789.

The Revolutionary War and War of 1812 records have both been searched in an effort to aid you in securing the information you desire in regard to the soldiers named above. No claim for pension was found based upon service in the War of 1812 of a Banner Brummett, under any spelling of the name. Such claims are the source of data furnished by this office relative to soldiers of both wars. The record was found, however, of a Thomas Brummett of Virginia who later went to Tennessee, and it is given herein as found in the papers on file in pension claim, R. 1368, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War.

The date and place of birth of Thomas Brummett, whose name appears also as Brummet and Brummit, and names of his parents are not given.

Thomas Brummett enlisted in the State of Virginia sometime in 1777, served as private in Captain Clough Shelton's company, Colonel Green's Virginia regiment, was in the battles of Brandywine, Monmouth and Guilford and was discharged after having served three years for which he enlisted.

Thomas Brummett was allowed pension on his application executed October 17, 1812, at which time he was aged sixty-four years and a resident of Anderson County, Tennessee, where he was still living in 1830. He died November 20, 1842.

The soldier married about May 17, 1792 or 1793, in Knox County, Tennessee, Miss Mary Burris; the date and place of her birth and

names of parents are not shown. In 1845, she was aged seventy-seven years and residing in Anderson County, Tennessee, with post office at Robertson, in that county. She was still living in Anderson County in 1846 and died there November 6, 1847.

The following names of children of Thomas Brummett and his wife, Mary, are shown in the claim:

The following of the above-named children survived their mother, Mary Brummett, and in 1858 were all living in Anderson County, Tennessee: William Brummett who was still living in Anderson County in 1854; Elijah Brummett; James A. Brummett; Thomas Brummett; Sarah Braden; Anna White and Sinthia Bradshaw. The given names of the husbands of the three last named were not stated.

In 1848, one Elijah Burris who was born March 15, 1761, made affidavit in Anderson County, Tennessee, his relationship to soldier's wife, Mary, not shown. He had a son named Elijah, also, who was born February 15, 1792.

In 1844, the name of one Dorothy Braden appeared in the claim, her relationship to soldier's daughter, Sarah Braden, not stated.

In 1845, one Hannah Webb, aged fifty-two years, was a resident of Anderson County, Tennessee, no relationship shown to soldier's family.
