BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES AND FAMILY RECORDS.

THE records and personal sketches which follow in this volume are the collected labors of hundreds of persons. There was very little available for this department of the HISTORY OF BARNET when I began the work of its preparation. There has never been a resident of the town who gave, as the late Edward Miller gave to Ryegate, days, and months and years to the collecting of the annals of its people. A few sketches of the older Scotch families prepared many years ago by George Mason, and preserved from destruction by Mr. Miller, contained much which otherwise had been forgotten. In the case of a few families, some one of an early generation has rendered service to his descendants by having the names and dates of birth of his children recorded on the town books. It is only within sixty years that the registration of births, marriages and deaths has been required by law.

Consequently many persons and families once prominent in this town have no local memorial or living representative. This work will preserve the memory and deeds of hundreds of residents who would otherwise be forgotten. It has been my first purpose to collect the annals of the pioneers, those who came here more than a century ago, and their descendants. Barnet is one of the few towns in the State in which settlement began before the Revolutionary War, and these records cover a century and a half.

The collection and arrangement of some of these records was the labor of love with some representative of each family. In the case of others I have compiled the data offered by members of separate branches. With others their preparation has cost much research in quest of widely scattered members, branches of older families not known to each other, but whose younger members were glad to know their ancestry and living relatives.

There were other families of whom all that could be gathered was so meager that I have had to find missing names and dates from any source that I could. I have examined the records of several towns, the memories of aged people have been taxed, cemeteries have been visited, town and family histories consulted, and I have added hundreds of dates and names where they could be gathered from authentic sources.

I have written numberless letters of inquiry, and the few which were never answered probably never reached those for whom they were intended. The response has been most gratifying.

This volume will not only preserve the names of the noble men and women who have lived in Barnet, but will help to solve the problems of relationship which inter-marriage among families in long settled communities always produces.

Stevens of London for the loan of the Stevens journals and other valuable papers. To Miss Annie Harvey for the use of the journal of Colonel Harvey, thanks are also given.

Much assistance has been furnished by the late Governor Ide, and by Hon. Elmore T. Ide of St. Johnsbury; by Hon. John B. Gilfillan of Minneapolis; and by the late Dea. A. M. Whitelaw of Ryegate in the use of the General Whitelaw papers.

And last, but by no means least, acknowledgments are due to the publishers, and the engravers, by whose experience and skill this volume is made attractive to its readers.

A WORD FROM THE COMMITTEE

THE Barnet History just grew up of its own accord. The Secretary of the "committee" found the Ryegate History helpful in his McIndoes parish, and came to feel that it would be a bit of great good fortune for the town of Barnet to have its story told by the gifted author of the Newbury and Ryegate books. He talked with Mr. Wells about it in March, 1917. He talked with many Barnet people. John G. Roy spoke the first encouraging word. Presently Horace Warden and Walter Johnson joined in the conversations.

While we were wondering how to interest others in different parts of the town, Mr. Wells was turning to other work. To save Barnet's opportunity, this small self-appointed committee made a personal contract with him August 13, 1918. A suggestion that the town share in the undertaking was discussed in town-meeting in March, 1919—and not accepted. Realizing the priceless value of the material brought to light by Mr. Wells in seven months, the committee went ahead on their own responsibility—still planning to enlarge their numbers. They signed the printing contract October 9, 1919—and kept on paying bills and giving more and more time to the work, until now—at the end of 1922—the book is nearing completion in their hands.

The words of the book were left to Mr. Wells. At his request we did what we could with the pictures. All parts of the town were asked repeatedly to cooperate—a final message going to every family last August. All contributions have been used. We are indebted to Arthur Bliss Seymour of Harvard University for the camera with which many of the photographs were made; to the following for samples of their work: Katherine Bingham of St. Johnsbury, Ernest F. Skinner of Passumpsic, Mrs. Lizzie Kendall of East Barnet, Mrs. E. B. Chase of Barnet Village, Miss Lucy Buffum of McIndoes and Lyman E. Field of Worcester; to the Connecticut Valley Lumber Company for the lot map; to Miss Edith Wallace for various suggestions; to many persons for the loan of family portraits, and above all to the illustrator, Charles F. Lester (the Secretary's room-mate at Yale) for many long hours of work over the 140 photographs in his studio at 11 East 14th Street, New York City.

The book has been delayed beyond many promises—growing better all the time. It is not perfect yet. Such books never can be. But the committee is glad for what has been done. They are sure it will be of real service to the town, in making the seven parishes better acquainted with each other, with Barnet men and women of former days and other places and with their cousins in England and Scotland.

INTRODUCTION

THIS work completes the story of two colonies from Scotland which began settlement in adjoining towns in Vermont just before the outbreak of the Revolutionary War.

There is no reason to suppose that there was any previous acquaintance between the people of Renfrew and Lanarkshires who settled Ryegate, and those of Perth and Stirling who settled in Barnet. Communication between different parts of Scotland, a century and a half ago, was slow and uncertain. People who lived thirty miles apart were widely separated. Ryegate was chosen by the influence of Rev. Dr. Wither- spoon, President of Princeton College, afterwards one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, and Barnet was chosen for settlement because of its proximity to land which people from Scotland had begun to settle a year before. The letters of James Whitelaw show that if the war had not come on when it did, other companies from Scotland would have purchased lands and settled in the immediate vicinity. But the war changed all this, and Ryegate and Barnet, considered as one community, remain the only one in Vermont settled by a body of people from beyond the Atlantic. A curious circumstance is noted, that the brig "Molly," Capt. Thomas Cochran, Master, which left Greenock on the 25th of March, 1773, with James Whitelaw and David Allan, for New York, was the same vessel which, on the 19th of May in the next year, left that port for Philadelphia with Alexander Harvey and John Clark as passengers.

The materials for this work were less abundant than for the History of Ryegate. The business papers and correspondence of General James Whitelaw, carefully preserved by his family, guide us safely through the early years of that town, and have afforded much aid in narrating the early annals of Barnet. But, with the exceptions of the journal of Colonel Harvey, and the fragments that remain of that of Samuel Stevens, very little has come down to us regarding the work of the early settlers of this town until after the war. The loss of the early town records deprives us of much that nothing else can supply, and we are obliged to look elsewhere for our information regarding the small part which Barnet had in the Revolutionary War. The Bedel Papers, and the Hibbard Collection, owned by the New Hampshire Historical Society, some papers preserved at Montpelier, and the valuable Bayley and Johnson papers owned by the Tenney Memorial Library of Newbury are our authorities for the events of that period.

He learned the cabinet-maker's trade of Darius Harvey, buying the latter out in 1832, carrying on the business at Passumpsic several years making "cabinet work, also carriages and sleighs, employing several men". Travelling agent some years for E. & T. Fairbanks & Co. He built soon after marriage the house in which he lived till death, where his grandson, Mark K. Arthur Denio (b. 1868; d. 1950) and bur. with him at Passumpsic, q. v. (pp. 391,467,520).

I moved to Barnet Passumpsic Village the last of April I bought the Samboe place brick house and Barn and 7 Acres of Land ... I live within two Rods of Mrs. Hawes". This house and barn still stand (2007). It is the only brick house within the village limits, and was two houses south of where his wife's sister and her husband, Miles Shorey, lived in 1858 and 1875.

The area Jerreb and his brothers selected had become available to whites after the Black Hawk war of 1832. He purchased land in Perkins Grove, east of LaMoille, Ill. in 1835, built a cabin and returned to Vermont for Maria and Wallace³. Jerreb d. of Malaria Aug. 17, 1839. Maria sold what she had, paid her debts, gathered a few pupils, and taught school one summer in her sister's house. She then taught in LaMoille and boarded around among the patrons. She m. 2nd Nov. 3, 1843 Martin Hopps, a carpenter who took up land and became a successful farmer near LaMoille, originally of Charlotte Co., New Brunswick, Canada, and had three more sons. Maria is buried in the Greenfield town cemetery in LaMoille, Ill. between her husbands.

There he met Fidelity Bacon of Enfield, Mass., who was visiting her brother in nearby Princeton. They m. Enfield, Mass. Nov. 22, 1864. Wallace begat 5 dau. and a son in LaMoille; rem. 1882 to Marshall Co., Iowa; rem. 1890 to Waterloo, Black Hawk Co., Iowa, where his wife d.; he rem., for the last time, in 1910 to join his youngest dau., Charlotte, and husband, Albert Julien, farming and ranching in Alberta, Canada. He d. Drumheller, Alberta Oct. 3, 1937 at the age of 100.

He wrote to his son' s widow, Maria, in Illinois, postmarked from Passumpsic Apr. 18, 1840 (25¢ postage) saying, "I have been living at Lyndon Corner one year. I moved to Barnet [Passumpsic Village] the Last of April I bought the Sambon place Brick house and Barn and 7 Acres of Land ... I live within two Rods of Mrs Hawes" [JK]. This house and barn still stand (2007), it is the only brick house within the village limits, and was two houses south of where his wife' s sister and her husband, Miles Shorey, lived in 1858 [Walling] and 1875 [Childs].

"Only four of their 12 children [were] still in Vermont" by 1840 [Betlock, p. 29].

Jerreb and "Maria" met when she was a school teacher and he the school director and farmer near Eden, Vt. Enticed by "stories told of the rich prairie country of Illinois without mountains or stones", Jerreb and Maria were already preparing to leave when their son, was born in 1837. The area Jerreb and his brothers selected had become available to whites after the Black Hawk war of 1832. He purchased land in Perkins Grove, east of LaMoille, Ill. in 1835, built a cabin and returned to Vermont for Maria and Wallace³. Jerreb d. of Malaria Aug. 17, 1839 [Maria Aug.25.1839.ltr]. Maria sold what she had, paid her debts, gathered a few pupils, and taught school one summer in her sister' s house. She then taught in LaMoille and boarded around among the patrons [son.Wallace.ltr]. She m. 2nd Nov. 3, 1843 Martin Hopps, a carpenter who took up land and became a successful farmer near LaMoille [EW], originally of Charlotte Co., New Brunswick, Canada [Ill.m.index], and had three more sons [Betlock, p. 29]. Maria is buried in the Greenfield town cemetery in LaMoille, Ill. between her husbands [Betlock, p. 29].
